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#### Weak script saps Love from a

A two-set play with a change of scenery between the first and second acts was the latest production by the ambitious and usually competent Blechingley Amateur Dramatic Society, last week.

The drama "Love From a Stranger" is based on a story by Agatha Christie and written by Frank Vosper. The plot is simple, involving two girls living in a flat, one of whom rejects her steady boy friend's proposal and marries a handsome American, who eventually turns out to be a murderer.

His victim escapes death at the last moment by convincing her husband, who has heart trouble, that he has been poisoned. He collapses presumably with a heart attack.

#### **ADEQUATE**

The two girls, Mavis Wilson and Cecily Harrington, were

played adequately by Marian | Naylor) at the couple's country month.

Bruce Lovell, the murderer, played by Peter Benson, was a strange character. The gaps in his American accent, which faded at times, were explained when the audience heard the murderer had been educated in England. Despite moments of overacting. Mr Benson was the most capable character in the performance.

Nigel Lawrence, the gallant rejected suitor, was a likeable character admirably portraved by Geoffrey Cowperthwaite. Lesser parts all tended to suffer from overacting, except that of a village doctor played by Frank Johnson.

Gardener (Frank Ffoulkes) and maid (Alison Leyland-

Wilson and Priscilla Kinin- cottage were far too rustic to be convincing. Their script was particularly weak.

As far as the change of set was concerned, the production was undoubtedly a success. The scenery was strong and convincing and the furniture well chosen.

#### CLEVER SETS

The change from town flat to country cottage was swift and silent. A backcloth of roofs and chimneys in the first act was creased and in poor perspective, looking more like an ornamental screen than a view from a window. A clever evening effect was given by gradually dimming the lights on this backcloth.

#### Stranger

Aunt Louise, a dithering but well-meaning relative, played by Doreen Reekie, although overacted and suffering from a poor script, aroused laughter from a certain section of the audience.

This success, however, did not extend to the production as a whole. The main trouble was the rather feeble script. The play warmed up in the last scene when Lovell tried to murder his wife but until then events dragged along. I expected a more polished performance and a better choice of play from this society.--RST
