BLETCHINGLEY Amateur Dramatic Society set themselves a difficult task when they tackled Charlotte Hasting's "Bonaventure", at the Village Hall last week.

Despite good solo performances, and evident hard work, the weaknesses in the group and production were highlighted by this demanding play.

It is set in the convent of a French Nursing Order based near Norwich and the year is 1947.

As the curtain opens, violent — but unfortunately silent — storms threaten to destroy a dyke and flood the village. The nuns prepare a refuge.

Stranded by the floods when the dyke does break is a condemned murdress on her way under escort to be hanged.

The play revolves around the

disturbing influence on the peace of the convent of the elements and a convicted killer.

The spiritual struggles, personal conflicts and tragedies require a depth of portrayal beyond the reach of many of Bletchingley's cast.

Angela Sampson handled the part of the condemned brotherkiller well but it was not easy.

She needed to keep the sympathy of the audience so that they cared whether she was guilty or not but at the same time recoil people with her stubborn pride.

Alongside Angela, Shela Illsley in the title role of Sister Bonaventure had a definite stage presence and abilty to hold attention. When her confidence failed however she lacked power.

John Buck is to be congratulated for his treatment of the childlike Willie.
