


barbara saunders

Steel Magnolias **Bletchingley Players**

I LIKE the idea of theatre combined with a supper evening - what an excellent chance to meet friends, eat and be entertained all at one time. But if the theatre element is to be given a chance to take its proper place, then the play must be carefully chosen. Two one-act pieces are ideal and even a frivolous comedy or farce would fit in. Not, though, something like Steel Magnolias, which not only is worth close attention from the audience (not always easy after a satisfying plate of fish and chips) but which suffers loss of impetus due to the inevitably long break Bletchingley Players compounded this disruption with a prolonged raffle in a second interval. A pity, because director John Tomlin and his team had ut a great deal of effort into their production of Robert Harling's play, which is, by turn, humorous, tragic and uplifting.

The action is set in Truvy's beauty salon - the

hub of a small town in Louisiana - where wealthy women come to be pampered, exchange gossip and gently poke fun at each other. Cyril Mighall's set design created the location with care complete with basin, working tap and hairdryer. Local hair studio, Streaks Ahead, had loaned much of the paraphemalia expected in a hairdresser's and this was subtly but noticeably moved around as it would be over the two-and-ahalf years spanned by the story. The only significant technical problem was that the offstage dog barking was too loud and abrupt and, in combination with gunshots, drowned out several lines at the end of one scene

Emma Davey acted with feeling in her role of Shelby, the strong-willed young bride. The way in which she lost control during a diabetic attack looked and sounded particularly realistic and there was also sincerity in her sometimes loving, sometimes fractious relationship with her mother,

played with understanding by Liz Tomlin. It was less easy to believe in Clairee, portrayed

by Barbara Saunders. Although she held her accent well (as did the rest of the cast), she did not fully project the image of the wealthy, if

unpretentious, leading citizen.
Felicity Lund showed authority as Truvy - in many ways the pivot of the group, Annelle (Sally Harling) had the right, dowdy appearance when she was taken on as the new assistant who had escaped from a disastrous marriage but would surely have developed her sense of dress and, more important, of hair style under Truvy's

Susan Sarti maintained Ouiser's battleaxe expression and sour outlook right until she oftened, if only slightly and realistically, in the final, life-affirming scene.
